

Four paws up for new home

BELMONT construction company Pindan has opened the doors to its charity home in Viveash, after the design was given a canine seal of approval.

Proceeds from the sale of the three-bedroom, two-bathroom home – on the Waters Edge Estate – will go towards the Association for the Blind WA, supporting initiatives which include guide dog training, the social and life Skills activity camp, and equipment for the industry skills centre.

Guide dog Calvin joined the construction crew in March, and left his paw print in the foundations, next to a commemorative plaque which explains the significance of the home.

Estate project manager Troy Gorton said he was impressed by the dedication of those involved in the project.

“It’s been inspiring to see the team pull together to build the home – everyone has been putting in extra effort,” he said.
